very cat at ICS has a personal story. Some are sad, many happy and a few even funny. But Miller's story is special. He's somewhat of a medical miracle.

The stout orange-and-white kitty caught Michelle Pearson's eye when she began volunteering at the shelter after moving from Indianapolis in 2003 with her husband Greg. She admits to having a soft spot for strays, sharing their home with four cats-one of them also orange-and-white.

Miller became a favorite of Michelle's when she went to visit the cats in Freckles room (ICS has names for all our rooms). He was very mellow and sweet, and never pushy, patiently waiting his turn. When Michelle was petting Miller, she noticed that he had a sore on his nose.

After several trips to the local vet, Miller was diagnosed with an aggressive skin cancer that, if left untreated, would become painful and disfiguring. The Pearsons discovered that a vet at Purdue pioneered laser surgery* for this condition, but the cost was \$1500.

The members and volunteers at ICS answered the Pearson's plea for help in financing Miller's surgery. More than \$1700 was raised quickly and Miller traveled to

The good news is that after three treatments, Miller is fine and Purdue charged ICS only \$300 for the surgery, dipping into a fund they have for shelter animals.

"Miller is a very special cat," Michelle says. "I hope that one day he gets the kind of loving home he deserves."

Miller lives in Freckles' room with his senior friends.

*Photodynamic therapy is a laser treatment in which a chemical solution is absorbed by the cancer cells, but not by the healthy ones. A laser is then focused on the area, and the light is absorbed by only the cells containing the solution. In this way, the cancer cells are attacked, but the healthy cells are not harmed. Miller's had several trips to Purdue for follow-up appointments.

atience lounges on a floral quilt at the Heavilin's home. At the sound of our voices she is up and ready to follow Lorraine into the bright kitchen where Ralph welcomes us. I see that she has dropped a few pounds and looks fabulous in her Dilute Tortoiseshell outfit.

Six months ago her life was very different. She was dropped at the shelter seven years ago, a sickly but sweet kitten. After time and attention Patience was healthy and full of spunk. She was adopted as a teenager. She had a home for a year and a half.

She was returned for HAVING TOO MUCH SPUNK! A loaf of bread was missing and Patience was the culprit. She woke her people early in the morning. She attacked the screen door. When Patience came back she was depressed and didn't get along with other cats. They cornered her and gave her trouble for her outspoken opinions. She was given her own cage.

Over the years she got fat and a little grumpy but Ralph and Lorraine always got an enthusiastic greeting when they came the first Saturday of every month. "Patience was always there in the top cage," Ralph tells me. "When she was moved to the lower cage I thought I cannot see her die in there...Lorraine, let's take her home!"

It was meant to be. The reasons Patience was returned, the bread burgling, early hours and bug chasing on the screen door are charming personality quirks to the Heavilins. 
